A life changing experience with CAP

Thrist Church has been in partnership with Christians Against Poverty to provide a debt counselling service to our local community for more than five years. To help you see the impact of this service and of our wider church community, I asked one of my clients if they would share a bit of their story.

What has working with CAP had meant to you?

"Lifeline!!! CAP represents hope and is an organisation that listens and cares. Already it has taken a huge weight off my shoulders. A weight that was crushing me. Since coming to CAP, I've got a new perspective and feel like I'm on a path towards putting things in order. It took away my hopelessness - I had no plan, no strategy and didn't know where to begin. CAP went beyond debt counselling – it introduced me to a community which has relieved my loneliness and given me emotional support and strengthened my faith. Life took me in a different direction away from a place of faith but the church community has brought me back and I've met many wonderful people who have helped restore my hope."

asked if we could pray and within minutes the phone rang with a total change of tone from the council and an offer of help to enable me to stay in my home. The second time was with the utility company who had told me beyond all doubt that they would not listen to me and had a warrant to enter my home. You told me that you and others would pray, you called CAP, and a different person from the utility company then spoke to me like a human being and gave me the chance I needed. Both times these came at a point where I thought that God had given up on me, I couldn't take anymore, there was no hope and maybe God just didn't care. But when we prayed, he softened people's hearts and showed me that he really did care! It used to be something strange for me to ask God for something and

What was happening in your life before we first met?

"I've struggled with depression for a long while. This is a form of paralysis and it's difficult to explain. You can't even begin to help yourself. Even those who are trying to help you can get frustrated because it looks like you aren't even trying. The problems of life can even transform your character and cause you to lose your personality even to the point where I considered ending my own life. I am now in a very different place and even my family perceive me differently and more positively. "

What was the turning point for you?

"When we prayed together and God stepped in so obviously – twice!!! The first time was when all hope was lost and I was definitely going to lose my home. I had given up. You

rather I thought I just had to rely on myself but through all this, I've learned that turning to God first is a much better idea! Now I have hope! It's still hard but I can know with God's help I can tackle one thing at a time and I'm not alone."

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Journey of Faith



from **Caroline and Michael Keightley**

I've seen commitment time and time again, people giving their best. It's been moving and inspiring to see the hunger for God among the people

We soon bid farewell to our curate Caroline. She arrived as a single lady in pursuit of experience and direction from God and leaves having met and married Michael and gained a very clear sense of what is coming next in ministry. We sat down with them to find out how potential sheep rustling led to a date with destiny...



Q. For both of you, God is central to life. How did you come to faith?

Michael: My parents started attending church in Stevenage when I was eleven. There was not "one moment" for me; it was a series of experiences that led to a life of faith. I do recall a New Wine conference when I was thirteen as an important turning point. Mike Pilavachi preached and I remember being very moved; hours of tears on my knees.

Caroline: And madly, although we initially thought our first meeting was in a pub two years ago, I've just realised that I was at that same New Wine event! I became a Christian as a 14 year old. My faith journey started as a consequence of being threatened with suspension from school in Oxfordshire. That led to a big heart to heart with my mum until 0300 in the morning. That's an important detail because somehow we turned on the TV and there was Nicky Gumbal presenting an Alpha course! I promised my mum that if an Alpha course was on nearby, I would attend. Little did I know that a couple had arrived in town doing church planting- and they ran the course! I attended with my mum and that was pivotal to coming to faith

Q. That's how you met God. How did you meet each other?

C: In a pub around three years ago quite near the start of my placement at Christ Church!

M: I think we both felt immediately that God had arranged the meeting. Our conversation went on for hours and we both had a sense immediately that this was far more than a random social event. We lost track of time but of course Caroline left me wondering if she wanted to go on a second date.

C: Michael tried to act casual but texted me within a few hours!

M: I loved the fact that she had such enthusiasm to experience life. I've seen her jump in a river spontaneously as well as suggesting grabbing a kebab, putting on head torches and going on walks and prayer time. That led us up a hill in Bedfordshire one evening where the police suspected we were sheep rustling rather than being a young couple communing with the creator of the universe!

Q. And the proposal?

C: I'd warned him that if that day ever came, make sure I was having a good hair day. On the big day, he sent me off to Maria Lawrence, encouraged me to dress nicely and whisked me off to a restaurant where the staff had prepared a special reception. What else could I say but yes.

Q. Turning to church life, how did being in a relationship affect things?

M: In an ideal world, we would have been at

the same church at the same time but I have a job with Holy Trinity Brompton (HTB). That has always meant that I have some responsibilities there that has kept me from being with Caroline for the traditional Sunday morning services. But that's going to change soon!

C: Michael has been involved in lots of aspects of Christ Church and I think Escape is a great example – and highlight- of where we have worked together.



M: I'll take lots of positive memories from the church. It's really impressive to see so many people so committed to God and the number of ministries that people of all ages provide to the community. It's an inspiring congregation.

Q. And Caroline, your reflections on Christ Church?

C: My wedding will always be a very special memory. Sharing that with the church family was precious. Overall, the answer is "the people" and the relationships formed. I could list person after person or any number of events but it's always about the shared relationships.

Having said that, I have to describe Escape as a stand out and how God moved. Seeing young people in the church grow and develop – to really fly- is something that has inspired me; that's something I am determined to take forward.

Q. A lesson or experience from your time that is going to help you in the months ahead?

M: We were packing up after the Escape event and Bill said to me "it's like we made a new place for people to come and be." It struck me that it was much more than the logistics – it was a community. It inspires me to build those spaces for people to meet God.

C: I've learnt about doing the best I can; excellence in ministry and service. I've seen commitment time and time again, people giving their best. It's been moving and inspiring to see the hunger for God among the people.

Q. And finally, the next steps?

C: I'm going to be the vicar of St Mark's at Colney Heath which is an evangelical C of E church – and I can't wait to lead them into a new season. The congregation is around 100 strong and are very active. We complete our time at Ware in late July. By the way, there is an open invitation to my installation service on September 12th.

M: Clergy are gently encouraged to be discreet when visiting public church services that you are considering applying to. There are no such guidelines for spouses so I went along "undercover." I slipped in to a meeting and found the welcome profound and moving. In departing, one lady said "I love this church and hope you come back." I got to my car, cried my eyes out and wanted that place to be my church.



When I look at Ware, and the whole world, I see a lot of injustice. Homelessness, poverty and loneliness are things I see all the time. When I first came to church I had needs like those and I felt God and His people really wrap their love around me. We don't go to church because we are perfect, we can grow all the time – in faith, hope and love.

FAITH Hebrews says that to have faith is to be sure of things we hope for to be certain of the things we cannot see. When we go through life, we face many changes. What school will I go to? What is the right job for me? As we get older, we have different challenges to face. In Galatians 2:20 it says that we should live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave his life for me. I'd encourage everyone to feed their spirit by following Jesus. Your faith will get stronger.

HOPE If we put our hope in God then he will renew our strength. It says that in Isaiah 40. I'd be surprised if any of us had not experienced disappointment at some time in life. God knows about every single one of them and we must keep taking them to Him in prayer and have hope. God is working in us to shape and build us into the image of Jesus, his highest passion.

Thankfully, we are seeing in our own church that God is working through CAP to help people and show God really cares. Help exists and we can pray for these people and ask for God's guidance.

It is easy to judge others and they are times we may all be angry and hang on to these things that make us angry and hold on to the grudges with people with problems. It is our God that teaches us to forgive and love our neighbour as ourselves.

A Day in the Life

A day in the (school) life of Jess Cole our Children's Worker...

On **Monday mornings** I lead assemblies at Christ Church School and base them on the values for the half term. We have been exploring truthfulness recently and I usually get the children involved in a game or activity. It's an amazing opportunity to share about Jesus. I have made a Bible box and each week a child will come and open the 'Bible' while the rest of the children chant and clap 'what's in the bible'. In the box there is an object which links to the story. We always say the Lord's Prayer together before closing in song.



At **Monday lunchtime** I make myself available for any children who want to drop in to see me. This might mean sharing worries or just a chat. I'm there to listen.

On **Wednesdays** I take six children and play games or do a craft activity. The aim is to spend time simply nurturing them as individuals and building up good relationships and trust. I love it when I am out in Ware and a child walks past with their parents and often says 'Hello Jess!' Who knows where this might lead to?

The rest of my day I spend in the office where



I do all my planning for the assemblies, lunch clubs, socials, Sunday morning children's church sessions and any other admin. At the moment I am also busy thinking through all the many details for the holiday club!

Holiday Club - I am passionate about reaching out to the community to tell them about Jesus and believe this holiday club is a fantastic opportunity to do so in a fun, exciting way and to build relationships between the church and these children and their families in a fun environment. I have never run one before and so appreciate the wise words and input I have received from those with experience!

We will be using a Scripture Union resource called Team Builders, using Bible stories to explore the nature of a "team" to show what it means to work together and ultimately be part of Jesus' team.

The Holiday Club is for 5-11 year olds and is happening 12th-15th August in the mornings at Christ Church centre. If you are available to help on any or all of the days please speak to me.



How I get myself in the position to do this? - I always try to start the day with some time reading my Bible and bible notes and praying. I am attempting to read the Bible in a year (might take me a bit longer!). I also try to walk to work as often as I can as I love spending this time praying about the day, asking God to guide my thoughts and actions. As a staff team we meet in the morning to pray together and read scripture.

I am an extrovert but have found it so helpful to be able to return to my quiet flat at the end of the day where I can reflect, finish reading the chapters for the day (if I ran out of time in the morning!) and relax. Two things that have really helped sustain me are belonging to a Life Group and having a prayer partner... if you don't have either of these I really recommend doing so!

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Men at Work with God (or 'Ageing Better in Birmingham')

God has given each one of us different gifts. When we team together with God, these gifts become powerful tools that can be used to support God's mission for our church. For the last four years the MADD group have sent working parties in support of our mission partners James and Mel Lynch in Birmingham, who work with Interserve, a missionary organisation looking to build up links between the Christian and Muslim communities in the area. Our main purpose was to work on the buildings and in the grounds of St. John's, a former Anglican nunnery, which is now the home of a small Christian community involved in outreach to the people of Alum Rock in East Birmingham. Parts of the building are also being converted to offices to serve as Interserve's headquarters in the UK.

Six men made the trip this year – Richard Clayden, Peter Dane, Andrew du Boulay, Neil Pearce, Ron Porter and Andrew Wang. The two big jobs were to move a summer house, including its base and to work on a flat recently occupied by the community's new hosts Liz and Allen. God's timing is immaculate because they had only just arrived from long term mission in Pakistan, so the many small jobs we were able to do really helped to make them feel comfortable and welcome in their new home. In addition, we completed many other tasks including installing a screen in the chapel, sanding and varnishing two refectory tables and a dresser, moving a tree and some very heavy memorial stones.

Each trip has allowed us to learn more about James and Mel's work with the local community. Mel continues to run Women of Worth, a craft and conversation outreach, while James is actively engaged with the local community forum and also increasingly through connections with the St Margaret's Unity Hub which is part church (Sundays only!)



and part community centre. We were able to talk to the manager there and learn how holding Muslim activities in a Christian space is helping to break down misconceptions about different faiths. We also visited a local mosque, which was made up of two converted terraced



houses. As the houses were not orientated towards Mecca, the worship hall had to be placed at an angle to the walls. The Imam was very friendly and patiently answered our questions, even though it was only a short time before the main prayers on Friday.

We also joined in the life of the community at St. John's. This included morning and evening prayers, and midday communion. We found it was very important to take these breaks from our work activity and reconnect with God. It was amazing the dividend gained from prayer which more than compensated for the apparently lost time.




Each year our accommodation has improved in quality. This year we each had our own individual rooms, with tea and coffee making facilities. Next year we will be expecting ensuite bedrooms! We were also well looked after by our hosts who are excellent chefs and shared some special Pakistani dishes with us as well as a MADD shepherd's pie.

James & Mel work with Interserve seeking to help and encourage Christians and churches to relate to and to build relationships with the community around them and share the good news of Jesus Christ. James and Mel have worked for 11 years in partnership with Riverside Church in the communities of South Birmingham. For the past 4 years they have divided their time between this and several new community development projects in East Birmingham.

James works with local Muslim men working to make a positive difference in the community through reducing crime, anti-social behaviour and isolation. The group patrols the local Alum Rock neighbourhood several times each week and has seen some really encouraging signs that their efforts are making an impact in an often much troubled local community.


James also serves on the Board of St Margarets- a church/community project in nearby Ward End. St Margarets hosts the Unity Hub- a project providing activities and services such as Foodbank and activities for elderly and isolated residents.



Good friends are only a phone call away

Norman is one of the team travelling to Rwanda in July. Whilst there, he will be re-connecting with a friend with whom he shared a very special phone call...



"In 1994, I was a minister in a Buntingford church and we hosted a fellow clergy member from Rwanda called Philbert. During the trip the situation in his home country took a terrible turn; in fact there was genocide which ultimately led to around 800,000 lives being lost in a country not much bigger than Wales.

It was an almost unimaginable situation. Philbert had not been able to contact his wife for several weeks even before the atrocities took place and so did not know where his wife Godelieve was – or even if she had survived.



One Sunday evening, we finally managed to get a call through via Uganda and then a radio link into Rwanda to what he believed was a church safe house that she might have fled to. Miraculously, we made contact with her; they used a car battery their end to run the radio link. They spoke in a mixture of English, French and their native tongue but in very hushed tones as they did not want the militia to know that anyone was in this semi-derelict house. The situation was extremely severe; Godelieve and her companions couldn't even move or bury dead bodies in the courtyard in case it aroused suspicion.

Despite the horror, there were tears of joy and prayers at the reunion by phone. Soon after, the UN arrived and we had the privilege of meeting the whole family in a later visit to the UK. In July, we are planning to meet up with Philbert and his family as part of our itinerary."



There is a huge difference between knowing something in your head and living it in your heart. For Claire, that has been a life long struggle; outwardly successful but feeling very different inside. Recently, God stepped into the middle of her situation in dramatic fashion...

Every day, I would tell myself "you are stupid, fat and ugly." If anyone complimented me, I thought they were lying. Having cancer did nothing to improve my self-esteem. Over the last few months, God had been nudging me about how He sees me through songs like 'You Say' by Lauren Daigle but one Sunday, He decided I wasn't listening to the soft, still voice so He shouted through a megaphone!

Ironically, I had just met a friend who had told me about an extraordinary, supernatural encounter she had experienced so drove home thinking "How come God never speaks so clearly to me?" and answered myself with "because you are rubbish." Fast forward to Sunday at church with the song 'Break Every Chain' on my mind. Caroline spoke on the armour of God and how so many Christians believed themselves to be bad and didn't like themselves. I was fascinated and listened intently.

John led a time of response and this is where things started getting odd.

I heard John say, "Claire this is for you". I looked around to see if there was another Claire in the room. Maybe I imagined it. Again, I heard John say my name and ask me to respond. Then a third time. Up I went for prayer.

'S' asked me what I wanted. "For what John said", was my reply. Afterwards, 'S' said she had independently seen a picture of chains breaking away from me.

Thinking this was all very odd, I asked a friend to confirm that John had said my name. "No – why?" Shaken, I sat for a while before joining my Life Group who were on coffee duty.

'D' who I barely know walked into the kitchen, stood in front of me and said, "Did you listen to the talk?" Yes said I. "To all of it?" Yep. "So why don't you love yourself as Jesus loves you? He loves you so much". 'D' hugged me and walked out leaving me open mouthed.

Before I had time to recover, 'A' approached me and said that the talk was for me. She talked about the Garden of Eden after the fall, the question God had asked Adam and Eve was "Who told you that?". 'A' went on to say that this is what God is saying to me about all the lies I tell myself "Who told you that?". The answer is the devil. And every time I believe them, I am turning away from God.

So, by the end of the morning, I had got the message! I am a loved and precious child of God.

Please pray for me: It is hard to change the habits of a lifetime, but I am trying. Every time I think negative things about myself, I check myself and say, "that is a lie and not how God sees me". Ron's Reflections

It's too big! No!

It's too big to miss!

This is a reflection on a sermon by Darran several weeks ago. (it's what he said!)

Sometimes in our lives we face problems which appear insurmountable. However, remember: Life may give us problems; Jesus gives us solutions!

Like King David, God has given us a Spirit of boldness to stand against the things that may be trying to bring us down.

David's brothers were quaking before Goliath. David got angry and asked who did Goliath think he was, coming against the Almighty God of Israel (and our God too!). He didn't use Saul's armour or weapons because he was relying on God, not man. He used the skills God had given him and the tools he was familiar with.

Be bold like David; stand up against your problems in the strength of God and with His spirit of boldness in you.

Remember: the problem is NOT too big; it is TOO BIG TO MISS!

A House of Prayer for all the peoples. ISAIAH 56:7

On the face of it, Mark is heavily involved in the church's prayer life. He leads the Tuesday lunchtime meeting, is central to previous 24/7 prayer weeks and has been attending the Monday evening combined church prayer sessions. So why does he feel so frustrated about his own lack of prayer?

"I see the effect that regular prayer has on me, the intimacy of being in the Father's presence and the transformation that occurs in my life as a result. Not only that, but when we join together in corporate prayer, we build both community through being a body united, and we take on the battle in the spiritual realm for the protection and health of our church and community. In the 30 years that I have been a Spirit filled Christian, I have seen time and again that the occasions that I witness God move most powerfully are preceded by intense and purposeful periods of prayer by the whole team involved in each service or event.

So far, so good. In Christ Church, we hear 'Behind everything we do is prayer' from John at most services but I wonder in practice how true that is. Let me confess that I am highly inconsistent in the time I spend praying, but I remain convinced that this is the key that will unlock power of God in our lives and in our church.

I was deeply challenged when I took Sophie to one of the newly restarted monthly prayer evenings. On the way home, she asked where all of the younger people where. Not only was she the youngest person there, but I was the second youngest! I am concerned for the future health of the church if everyone under the age of 50 leaves corporate prayer to 'other members of the congregation'.

Throughout the gospels and the rest of the scriptures, prayer is integral. I am convinced that the enemy knows this only too well and tries everything to keep us from regular prayer.

I don't always enjoy the prospect of 'a prayer meeting'; however even in my reluctance to attend, I almost always find myself refreshed and challenged by the Holy Spirit. We may be busy with good, even God, things, but if we are too busy to gather together to pray, then I would question whether we are perhaps too busy?

I write these words as a person struggling to live out a rhythm of prayer, but also as someone who believes that God wants to do so much more through us – but in His strength.

If, like me, you sometimes think that that a prayer meeting in church can be a bit "dry" then I challenge you to look again. Not only do the monthly prayer meetings have creative prayer stations, more importantly you'll encounter the presence of God! Alternatively why not try something different while praying together?


