

A Day in the life of...

Each issue, we invite one of our congregation to describe how they invite God into a day in their life. This time, Dot explains a typical day as Head Teacher...

Those of you who know me well will be aware that I am much happier talking about other people than myself. However this is my story of a typical Monday in my life, and how I involve God in it.

Before any career responsibilities, I am first and foremost a wife to Richard and Mum to Robbie, Henry and Rebecca. I start the day with a shower and pray for any potential difficulties or difficult meetings that day. Then I make sure the children are getting ready for school and help with any last minute panics about P.E. kit etc., before I set off to work. While I am writing this, Rich is currently away in India and I am missing him so much.

I have the great privilege of being the head teacher of a small church primary school and I always enjoy the relative calm of the car journey because once I arrive at work it is non-stop until the end of the day. We have a breakfast club, so I like to greet those children and check in with my staff before logging on to the computer and reading emails.



Every Monday, we have a service in the church, which is very conveniently located next door to the school. Our vicar is a blessing to our community, and we will have a chat about prayer needs while the children arrive. Our service includes worship songs, teaching and prayer and I cannot imagine many better ways of starting your working week than being with children joyfully praising God. We have chosen Matthew 5:14-16 as a Bible verse that sums up our vision, and *'This Little Light of Mine'* is our theme song. Following the service, we have coffee with parents and it is great to catch up on their lives.

After church, I take a group of children for reading and then have a variety of meetings, paperwork and activities before our staff

meeting at the end of the day. I work with an amazingly talented group of teachers. Love is one of our seven school values and I feel very loved at my school. Often we then have governor meetings, where we prayerfully petition God to help us in making wise decisions for our community, before I set off home to spend the rest of the evening catching up with my family.

In the busyness of the day, I can be guilty of forgetting to give my problems and difficulties to God. (I do not think that it is a coincidence that when I do remember, solutions often fall into place for difficult situations). Fortunately, I am supported by my church family, who lift me up in prayer and help me practically. Please can I take this opportunity to say thank you to Elaine, Maggie, Ange, Ben, Birgitt, Catriona, Judith, Jan, Martin, Jacqui, Heather and John in particular. Jan Young is our new governor and it is like having my favourite aunt at work with me. Thank you also to the fabulous MADD men who recently helped us with a classroom move – that reminds me, I think Rich still owes them a beer.

If you would like to visit, you would be very welcome, but not all at once as the school is very small!

Holiday of a lifetime

What could we do to celebrate the year in which Catriona has a special birthday and we also celebrate our silver wedding anniversary? Ahh yes, we'll go to Israel and see first hand where Jesus was born, grew up and died. There's so much to tell and I can only give brief highlights here. Feel free to come and ask us more...

Day 1 - We arrived in Tel Aviv, along with our tour party. We had the rest of the day to ourselves so Catriona and I wandered off to the local beach to enjoy a leisurely stroll and drinks at sunset.

Day 2 - Off to Caesarea, a city/sea port built by Herod, named in honour of Augustus Caesar who, as a result then gave the territory to Herod as a gift. Looked round a restored Roman amphitheatre built by Herod in 25BC which is still used for events today. We also see evidence of Pontius Pilate with his name inscribed on an original stone tablet.

Fascinating to see the lengths they had to go to, to satisfy the rulers of the time. A visit to Acre or Acca, a walled city with wonderful architecture originally established in the Bronze Age (around 3000BC) which had been ruled by both King David and King Solomon and mentioned the Old Testament. Laterly a Crusader stronghold.

Day 3 - To Nazareth and the Church of the Annunciation where the angel Gabriel appeared to Mary to tell her the news that she was going to be the mother to Jesus. The church is said to be built on the site where Mary lived. Nearby was St Joseph's church; supposedly built on the site of his carpentry workshop.

Then to the church of the Mount of Beatitudes where Jesus gave the famous sermon. Here we could stand under the cloisters looking over the Sea of Galilee, so peaceful and quiet. Next, a boat trip. When the crew hear we're all English the response was 'ahhhhh, fish 'n chips'! They played a few cheesy songs, but then What a Beautiful Name by Hillsong worship. This final song was just the perfect song for this moment and brought tears to the eyes!

Day 4 - A swim in the Dead Sea really refreshing, and a trip highlight for me. Then to Masada, a fortress built on the top of an isolated rock by Herod around 30BC. History shows that the Romans were enslaving Jews around 70AD and around 800 Jews shut themselves off in the fortress so that they would not be captured. It took the Romans three years to scale the mountain and when they did, the Jews set everything on fire and committed mass suicide to prevent themselves becoming slaves or being killed by the Romans.

After this we made our way to Jerusalem where we were going to stay for the last three days of our holiday. On arrival, we went for a walk to Old Jerusalem and wandered through the maze of cobbled streets - amazing place!

Day 5 - On to Yad Vashem, the Jewish Holocaust Museum, learning what the Jewish people had to endure. Awful stories. The museum was built in such a way that it represented a triangular tunnel and the further you went, the exit (or light) at the end got bigger and brighter.

Then north to see the aqueduct which was built to carry fresh water to the city from over 10km away from the Shummi springs.



On to Bethlehem, now under Palestinian rule and surrounded by military checkpoints. This means that Israelis are no longer welcome but thankfully tourists are! Here we went to the Church of the Nativity, believed to be the site where Jesus was born. Sadly it seems as though Bethlehem now solely thrives off the tourist trade (there's even a McDonalds there, but before you ask, no we didn't!)

Day 6 - Garden of Gethsemane, the place where Jesus was betrayed which is beside the Church of All Nations, then on to the Church of Mary Magdalene (or the St Mary Magdalene convent) on the Mount of Olives. After this we went into the old city of Jerusalem and shown round the various districts starting at the Dung Gate!



We stopped and prayed at the Wailing Wall (sorry Western Wall, you're not supposed to call it the Wailing Wall) and those that wanted to, wrote a prayer on a piece of paper and inserted it into the wall. There was a fair amount of tension amongst the locals. We came across someone trying to take a photo (we were warned not to) and a Jewish orthodox priest started arguing with him. Military police, brandishing rifles were on scene very quickly!

We then followed the Via Dolorosa, which is believed to be the route that Jesus took to the cross and leads to the Catholic Church of the Holy Sepulchre.

In the afternoon, after our day's tour was over, Catriona and I went off on our own to the Garden Tomb next to the Rock of the Skull, where the Protestants believe Jesus was buried. This site was purchased by an English charitable trust in 1894 and now manned by representatives of the charity. We were warmly welcomed and shown a tomb that 'could' well have been where Jesus was buried and we were provided with communion to take together.



Day 7 (Sunday) - A free day in which we went to Christ Church in Jerusalem! We took part in a very moving communion service (ask me why), and then walked part of the ramparts from Jaffa Gate to Herod's Gate. From here you could look down and see all kinds of things such as the Dome of the Rock, said to be built over the foundation stone where Abraham prepared to sacrifice his son Isaac. After this we went into town for some last minute shopping where I even tried my luck at bartering.

Day 8 - Sad that it had come to an end, it was a wonderful experience and one that I feel words cannot do justice to. If you ever want to go, I would thoroughly recommend it.

Awesome!

Be still and know that I am God -

God speaks to us now just as He did in biblical times. This may seem like an obvious statement but it becomes more real when you have a personal encounter and that encounter can happen anywhere.

My experience was actually hearing God speak to me but I am also aware that He can speak to us in many different ways.

Around 18 months ago, I was attending a Christian conference. To finish the day there was a Eucharistic service. It was very different from what I was familiar with. As part of the service we were encouraged to be silent for long periods and to listen. I was happy to do this with no expectations.

It was during this quiet time that I heard **Psalm 46:10A Be still and know that I am God.** When I first heard this it really didn't register. But then it was rerepeated over and over. **Be still and know that I am God.**

Whilst I was still listening the rest of group started to sing. **Be still for the presence of the Lord.**

I went into what I now call a spiritual 'melt down' but which ended with a positive outcome. Before my encounter I wasn't aware that I was 'burdened'. My tears felt like a cleansing and I came away feeling refreshed and free.

So now whenever I hear Psalm 46:10 being read and the hymn **Be still for the presence of the Lord** being sung it takes me right back to that day but now it's a joyful experience.

What I have learnt from that experience is that I need to make time and space for God. Also that space can be anywhere but I also need to listen.

...Granny who heard "Pray" down the phone. She knew that something terrible had happened to her daughter and grandchildren.

My name is Charlotte Dipper and at three weeks old I went to heaven and back.

It was around 6pm on 23rd November 2001. After a long day taking the children to see Father Christmas at Van Hages, mum was busy organising bath time for my sister, a capable two-and-a-half-year-old girl and me, her three-week-old new born baby. Mum was doing it single handed because Dad was in Pakistan as part of the relief response from the bombing in Afghanistan.

The phone rang and a kind and understanding voice- her own mum- echoed down the line. Having left the two of us in the bathroom safely away from the 3cm deep water in the inflatable baby bath housed inside the larger acrylic one, she sobbed down the phone to her own mother in the room just leading off the bathroom due to being a tired young mum. What she did not know was that, having sensed that mummy was tired and upset, my sister decided to help by undressing us both before lovingly placing me in the bath, her intentions pure and deeply selfless.

After about five minutes on the phone, my big sister ran to mum in the living room. Instantly mum asked "where's your sister?" The toddler replied "In the bath." Dropping the phone, mum rushed into the bathroom to find her baby dead, face down in the puddle of water.

In survival mode she lifted me out of the bath and hung me upside down to allow the water to drain out of my lungs. Vitally, she had a nurse and midwifery background, having the critical knowledge of treating neonatal babies. She then ran back to the phone, still clutching me upside down and uttered the single word "Pray" to her mum. Ringing 999, she kept the phone on her neck and gave chest compressions on the corpse that limply hung from her body.

Ambulance Control Centre instructed her to resuscitate my tiny lifeless body and sent out an emergency ambulance. "I know what I'm doing" the mother replied, and she continued her emergency medical training on the life that she had brought into the world just 26 days prior.

Never stopping the chest compressions and resuscitation, she gave the paramedics access, crying out a single prayer to God, "Lord have mercy!" Only eleven months before her baby niece had died of meningitis. Gasps of air escaped from my seemingly lifeless body, desperately trying to find oxygen. The mother pressed my chest to her ear and a slow heartbeat echoed faintly just as the paramedics took over her life-saving actions.

A friend ran to the flat after getting a call



from Granny who heard "Pray" down the phone. She knew that something terrible had happened to her daughter and grandchildren. Whilst everything was happening, the small shaken toddler had helplessly watched as her mummy had suddenly flung her sister upside down and performed confusing things onto her. The presence of a familiar face helped enormously and she was carried into the ambulance alongside her mummy and me, covered in wires and buttons, lying on a giant bed.

They were blue lighted through central London to St Thomas' Hospital. After being dead for approximately ten minutes, the medical staff continued to resuscitate and stabilise me for over six hours in a critical condition. Eventually I was transferred to the ICU ward at Guy's Hospital. At the time of the accident dad was in Pakistan packing for home, and had a sense that something terrible had happened. Eventually he got into contact with mum and was told that his newly born daughter had drowned.

A week passed and during this time a

dedication service had already been planned on the Sunday at 2pm but was turned into a Prayer service. People gathered and prayed for a hundred per cent healing. When mum and dad returned to Guy's Hospital after the service at 3pm the doctors said that all vital signs changed and improved significantly between 2-3pm.

Meanwhile a call for prayer around the world went out for "an English baby that had drowned." A doctor in the night suggested to use an enzyme that was typically used for premature babies to improve the development for immature lungs. It was a success. The combination of pioneering medicine and prayer contributed to my survival as a baby who physiology was a neonate; these babies have greater capacity to survive without oxygen.

A brother of a team member in Afghanistan said to his sister "I had a really funny dream last night, where a baby had died and went to heaven, they met Jesus and then went back to Earth". So, it seems that whilst I couldn't yet tell people of where I'd been, I was given a voice by a stranger on the other side of the world. Six months later a Give Thanks Service was arranged, this celebration of life acted as a testament to others that miracles do happen and that our Creator does not abandon us.

My Journey to Heaven

This account of heaven is drawn from dreams of heaven that started at the age of five. Future flash backs and visions continued in my later childhood and remain clear in my mind today.

Whilst everyone else was praying over the baby in hospital, the furthest ever journey was being made elsewhere. Blinding light, light that a human's eyes couldn't comprehend, radiates out of the Father's face, so bright I could not make out the facial features. Around me is white. The feeling of safety and home immerse every crevice of my being as I awaken to a kind smile. So loving, so tender. I can feel these secure arms gently holding me.

A small hand clutches my own hand which dangling beside me. The giggle of a child fills the air and I sense a familiar face gazing intently at me. My cousin, who went to heaven 11 months ago is wearing a red dress, beaming up at me and so excited that I am with her. There is no hint of illness, no disability, no tears, just love that I feel from

her, deep, all-consuming love. "Trust Child" God knowingly tells me as I lift my head to face him again. I was so happy, never had I ever felt so at peace, I had no questions, and wanted to stay resting against Him forever. I closed my eyes again and He said that He was not finished with me yet. I then awoke to the sound of beeping and strange metallic smells, knowing I had more to do on this earth.

Please pray:

- I have just celebrated my eighteenth birthday with friends and family. I love to swim, and I have no fear of water. Next year I hope to go to Queen's University Belfast in Northern Ireland to study Anthropology. Afterwards, I feel called to use what I learn to create places of safety and refuge where all people are free to connect the Good News of Jesus with the arising new generation.





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Who do you say I am?

In life, there are no end of things that we do together; decisions made in partnership. But to be a Christian, each of us is required to individually answer a big question that Jesus posed- "Who do YOU say I am?". Several of our brothers and sisters have told us about how they responded to that challenge...

Growing up in Malaysia, I was taught in school that your ethnicity defined your religion. So, being a Chinese, I was 'naturally' a Buddhist. However, despite being told that, I was always confused about my



faith since my parents rarely visited temples and we didn't have any altars at home that we prayed to. It was only on special occasions that I would follow my grandma to the temple to pray.

My confusion continued when I was introduced to Jesus and Christianity by one of my aunts, who was a Sunday School teacher, when she brought me to Sunday School. However, when I saw the other children singing songs, I was intrigued by their joy and spirit. Not long after that encounter, my mum was diagnosed with breast cancer and she eventually died about a year later, just before my 12th birthday. It was during that difficult and emotional time that led me to more questions – life, God and different religions.

Soon after, my family moved and I started attending Sunday School at my local church. One day, when the Sunday School teacher shared from John 3:16 about how much God loved us and sent Jesus to die on the cross for me, that story touched me very much. When the teacher asked who would like to give their life to Jesus, without hesitation, I put up my hand, said the sinner's prayers and invited Jesus into my life. I had an abusive stepfather, physical but especially psychological; "You will end up on the street", "You are worthless", "how can one be as stupid as you?", "No wonder you have no friends" were regular things I heard during my childhood. This was true for me, my brother and my Mother. I felt nothing but hate towards him and I blamed God for creating such a monster, especially when I witnessed the abuse towards Mother.

It could not continue so mum planned an escape for us but he almost broke her hand when she tried to flee to grandma's; mum's scream of pain and terror as vivid to me today as when it happened. I also remember a red haze come over me and I snapped, attacking him. Later, in court, I learned that I had pushed him into the fireplace, burning his hands quite severely.

Me, my mum and my Brother did escape that day and never went back. But the hell did not end. Mum was in total breakdown and tried to take her own life two times after that. Any faith I had ended completely - God was nothing but a fairy tale for weak minded people. I even tried to take my own life, but was saved by a friend – Mathias - someone I now call a brother.

Time passed, and I met my wife Hannah, a Christian and definitely not weak minded! The more I got to know her, the more I loved her and eventually I became more curious about God. I read, studied and began to understand God and feel His love. I realised that none of my childhood was God's doing; He had always been with me. I ended up praying for my stepfather, asking God to forgive him and as I did, I realised that I had forgiven him as well. Not what he did, but as a person.

I was finally able to leave the pains of my childhood in the past where they belong and move on. Today I proudly call myself a Christian. When I found my wife, I also found God. And now I finally fully feel that I have a meaning and a place in life. God helped us escape that night, God helped mother survive and to find happiness again, God made sure that Mathias was in the right place in the right time. And God made sure that me and Hannah, at the same time, started a certain game over the internet, and met for the first time. I hated him, I cursed Him, but He never turned his back on me.

My parents, whilst not Christians, raised me with many Christian values; Sunday's were a day of rest so no shopping or friends over! When I look back, it's very clear that God's hand was guiding me. My childminder was a Christian, I went to brownies, and also started to hear the gospel at my local youth club.



I remember from a very young age being quite adamant about the kind of man I'd marry. I don't know why it became important to me, but I knew for certain that I wasn't going to be messed around or have an inconsiderate, trendy but awful boyfriend. When I started secondary school there was a boy in my class who was a completely unashamed Christian, and he paid the price – often teased and people trying to argue with him a lot. I misbehaved a lot throughout secondary school, suspended in Year 7 for something pretty trivial, but as a result I just got savvier at trying to get away with things. The problem was the guilt, it doesn't matter how gutsy you are in terms of doing something naughty- it's very difficult to swallow or deal with the guilt. So for a quick laugh from my friends I'd do things that would tear me apart inside for days after. Gradually over years of the youth team supporting me and guiding me in accepting Jesus, and how to live as a Christian I accepted him as Lord of my life.

Jesus Christ is the only one who acknowledges guilt, and rather than telling us how to swallow it- takes all of our shame and guilt and hangs it on the cross. I still have that capability to be naughty, but I'm also a transformed woman- more and more, day by day, year by year. Jesus is Lord and King of the world. I'm not in charge and I don't have to get everything sorted. But my response to what He's done for me is complete gratitude, and to serve him and endeavour to do His will as much as I can. It's not easy, but it brings a contentment nobody else can offer you.

FUTUREhope has been greatly blessed by its long association with Christ Church, through its generous giving in personnel, finance and prayer. For example, our Chair is Dave Abbott, one of our own congregation. We asked Tim, their youth work co-ordinator, to update us on their work...

Over the past 16 years we have had the privilege to serve local young people and work alongside them to provide the following services: confidential one-to-one mentoring, weekly drop-in sessions in our mobile youth



centre, drug and alcohol awareness, group work (smoking cessation, anger management), parent courses, school sessions and training.

Please pray:



- for all the young people we work with - that they will have a growing sense of self-worth and that they will live healthy lives, finding peace and fulfilment.
- for our volunteers on the mobile centre and our mentors that God may give them wisdom and insight into the needs of the young people they meet. Pray for funds for another youth worker to support and expand our work.
- for peace and wellbeing in families of our local community and that we make real connections with those in need.

A growing number of young people today are facing substance abuse/misuse, problems at home, anxiety and school pressures. Referrals come from schools, GPs, parents and teenagers themselves. Our trained volunteers mentor them one-to-one for a year supporting and walking alongside them through whatever personal circumstances they find themselves.

We have discovered a growing need amongst parents for support and help through the teenage years. Our recent 'Time Out for Parents' courses have proved invaluable and more are planned. We also support schools in their PSHE programmes and seek to be involved with any parent work they do.

If the CAP fits.....

When non believer John Kirby attended a church barbeque over 20 years ago, he was a man who found himself living in chronic debt despite, ironically, being employed in the Financial Services industry. Through the warmth and support of his local vicar, John got help and ultimately found faith too. He vowed that no-one should face similar challenges alone and so set up Christians Against Poverty aka CAP. Fast forward to Christ Church Ware today and CAP has become a central part of our community support. We sat down with Sam to find out how that happened and what the future might hold...

Q. How did CAP become part of our ministry to Ware?

I have worked in the Investment banking sector for 24 years. However, I had long felt a desire to use my financial skills to help others. That led to a conversation with John Hookway about seven years ago. He knew about CAP, I wanted to be part of Kingdom building and so the seed was sown. To be precise, in 2013 we opened as a CAP Debt Centre and I now mix my banking work with two days a week volunteering here as Centre Manager.

Q. How is it structured here?

As an organisation, CAP is based in Bradford and employs 300 people who are particularly expert in the financial side of things. When someone calls the CAP Freephone number for help, it is Bradford that they get through to. For us as a local church, we are a type of franchise. We receive the initial appointment from CAP head office and then make contact with the potential client and visit them in their home.

I also have a co-worker in the form of Debs Thompson from Hertford Baptist Church, with whom we work in partnership to cover the local area. We also have a mini-army of volunteers that we could not do without!

Q: You mean church members?

Yes, I'd imagine we have over 30 people volunteering right now. CAP calls them supporters or befrienders and one of them will accompany me when we go to visit a client and will commit to praying for that person throughout the process and perhaps meeting up from time to time. It often develops into more than that – and occasionally less depending on the circumstances! Most often, help is very much welcomed and we have seen lots of wonderful things happen in the name of God.

Q. Is there a danger that the befrienders get dragged in to other people's crisis?

Not really. CAP is not so much about "crisis", but more empowering people to be able to plan for the future.

Q. How have things changed over the last six years?

In the last 18 months, all debt charities have seen a massive increase in calls for help. I think we have helped over 150 families in the last six years with perhaps 40 clients on our register now. That's pushing us to the limit where we meet five new clients a month between Debs and I.

Q. What is the ultimate goal?

Helping people to help themselves – empowerment - is the aim. We do not pay

off people's debts, we help them plan a way forward and ease the burden by negotiating with creditors on their behalf. That means it takes time for people to escape the slavery of debt.

CAP is clear that Jesus is central to and the reason why we help people. When we visit clients we always offer to pray with them there and then. The best news I have to offer is the Good News! Our offer of prayer is almost always accepted and the invitation to come to church is frequently taken up because we live out the gospel by "loving one another as God has loved us"

Q. What if we our readers are interested in getting involved?

That would be great, come and talk to me! Supporters tell me that it's an incredibly humbling and rewarding thing to hear someone else's story and realise that "there but for the grace of God go I." Jesus would be amongst the vulnerable and marginalised so it's right that we are. People in debt easily become isolated and feel defeated so support – even simple human kindness such as a smile and a listening ear - can make a real difference.



Soon after Jim and Joan moved to Ware two years ago, Sam invited them to help with the CAP cafe which meets every Thursday from 11.30am to 1:00pm in the Youth Centre. They readily agreed and now they run it, with other willing volunteers. We asked them to tell us more about it...



Jim, can you tell us what happens at the CAP cafe?

Well, there's plenty of free tea and coffee and delicious home-made cakes for a start, plus the healthy option of fresh fruit which the kids really seem to go for. It's a chance for our clients to just sit and chat, to socialise in a relaxed atmosphere. We have plenty of toys to keep them happy, though. Some come regularly, others drop in from time to time, and we can get anything from 4 to 10 people. If anyone wants to share about their situation we are there to listen but we never ask them. Anything they share also 'stays in the room', so we keep it confidential.

Joan, can you explain why you were so willing to be involved?

For the free tea and cake, of course! No, seriously, we did it because Sam asked us and now we really feel part of the family and we enjoy it. I should mention that we had come across CAP in our former church in east London where we had done the training course in budgeting so we knew how good it was. Some years ago we were also in a hard place financially so we know what it's like to struggle to make ends meet.

What are the highlights?

When a child asks "Can we come here every day?" When a client becomes debt-free and we have a big celebration! When we see the burden of debt lifted and God at work in people's lives and circumstances. We don't want people to suffer with debt and struggle on alone; we are here to help.
